Thinkin' bout adding more native plants to your garden . . . ?

I know you're concerned about Garlic Mustard ...

It's that time of year, please look at the edges of your properties, and also in our parks, trails when you're out for a walk. This is where it typically takes hold, undisturbed, no lawn mower threat....

It is NON-NATIVE, very invasive and hard to control. The best way is to pull it or weed wack it, and now comes the critical part: BEFORE IT FLOWERS AND SPREADS



MORE SEEDS. So, that means it needs to be taken care of long before it's 24" tall and very noticeable. Around the 1st of May is a good time as it's rather short 3-4" and therefore less debris to haul away. We expect Maple Park to be burned by a licensed firm (Integrated Lakes Mgt) before too long, so Maple should be taken care of.

Ravinia could be another story, however as the soil was disturbed there for renovation last year. Also, upon inspection last year, we noticed quite a bit on the fringes of private properties. All it takes is a few seeds to blow around in June and BINGO, a whole new crop pops up somewhere else, usually an easement because they don't get mowed and manicured like your lawns and landscapes do. Herbicides work, but also will take out whatever is next to it.

If you want to see a color picture of it, go to our website, www.slia.net then to the Environmental section, click on "plants and trees" and then "Invasive Plants" where a "lovely color picture" of this onion smelling critter is. Now picture a shorter version, with no white seed head. Pull, cut and put in a bag, throw away in your own garbage.

Do not worry that the garbage man will harass you that you are disposing of yard waste, as this is a BAD THING, and should never be composted (or burnt) by you or the landfill people. Your oaks and native ground covers will thank you for giving them more breathing room. And so will I!

Someone you should know...

Few of us have had such a hands-on opportunity to bring hope and peace to developing countries as one of our longtime neighbors.

Stephen Mongelluzzo has lived almost 30 years at 164 North Sylvan in the blue grey house with wisteria growing up to the balcony. But 4 to 5 times a year he travels to

developing nations for weeks at a time to counsel them in the ways of the democracy that we take for granted. His work as consultant for the US Treasury Department Office of Technical Assistance brings him to places most of us have only seen in the news.

At any given time he may be in Eastern Europe in war-torn Bosnia, Bulgaria, Azerbaijan or somewhere in the Ukraine. Or these weeks he might be in Africa in Botswana, Ethiopia, Ghana, Niger or little São Tomé Island off the northeast coast. Or maybe it's Latin America this time to visit Haiti, Nicaragua or Honduras. Whatever country he is in he is there to help bring stability to the country and its economy.

His specialty is with the taxing departments, working with the

governing bodies on communication skills, public relations, dealing with the news media and internal communications. All these areas will help developing countries to succeed as a democracy. The poorest country Steve has visited is the sub-Sahara Niger where in some areas the people have only a shack made of tree branches. In Lalibella, Ethiopia Steve visited several 14th century churches hewn from the top down **into** a mountain affording the priests complete and total privacy and safety.

For a country to qualify for the Treasury department to send Steve they must be a democracy and practice international human-rights. "...recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world"

On several occasions he has paid for his wife, **Lucya** to accompany him and together they can often take side trips to even more countries...Portugal, Zimbabwe or perhaps take in an African safari.

Unfortunately, for the past seven months Lucya has not been able to accompany Steve. She has been in and out of the hospital numerous times, heroically winning the battle with bladder cancer and through it all maintaining her usual optimism and good humor. She is an inspiration to us all.

Steve graduated from the University of Illinois at Chicago in

1967. The first 2 years he attended the school it was still located on Navy Pier. He worked on the school newspaper, which later evolved into a permanent position as sports information director. Steve says "It was the perfect job...I actually got paid for watching sports." He used to run the press box at Soldier Field when the U of I had home football games.

Steve was a Public Relations Officer for the IRS for 23 years, which led into his current position as expert consultant for the US Treasury.

In 1997 he started his own firm, FIRST Communications and has shared his expertise with individuals and organizations in both the private and public sector. For this he often travels giving lectures and seminars. Steve has written a book called
