Committee Reports:

- Kevin Adler & Jeanne Peterson reported no dues increase this year, thanks to good planning and good collection of dues.
- John Hynds reported that many bass were added this year, at no charge to us, as well as many aquatics plans. We ask that residents do not remove, or move any of the plants as muskrats are enough of a problem. John is happy to help waterfront owners with establishing vegetation on their shorelines.
- He reminded us <u>NOT TO PARK</u>
 on the boat ramp so that emergency
 vehicles have access at all times as
 well as Lake County for algae treatments.
- Lake County did a new Bathymetric map of our lake this year at no charge using their new equipment.
- Please use catch and release the bass. There seems to be a few non-residents catching lots of fish and carrying them away. Please confront those when you see them or alert a board member for help.
- A solar powered fish feeder has been installed and dispenses pellets twice a day. This was recommended by Lakes Mgt to help the bass population survive. More feeders will be added where residents can maintain them.
- Volleyball & Horseshoes are still going strong, but **Sam Ford** reports that younger teams are needed...(to injure the olders ones ??).
- Volleyball finals hosted an ice cream social this year. Dan Trahan's team came in first place.
- Sam Ford also reported that "spam" is being tacked up on our bulletin boards, so be aware and scold those that you may see. *Spam is defined as non-resident advertisements*.
- Mark Anderson oversaw an Eagle Scout Project in Ravinia Park. It replaced a foot bridge with a land bridge. It's much more stable to travel over, and it should still be

- there in 50 years. Erosion control is another benefit of a landbridge.
- Mark & crews replaced the basketball court at Bjorklund park and recently got the backstop installed over Octoberfest weekend.
- There is a new charcoal grill at the beach. A coal bucket will be next to it so that YOU can clean it out. (please remember the YOU part). Please don't leave a mess for others. Dan Trahan, John Hynds, Kevin Adler and Peter Graham installed it.
- Mary Harroun got volunteers to plant and look after 10 barrels of leafy & flowering vegetation around the beach area and fishing benches near the dam.
- The beach committee added some pier areas and old piers were turned into a sailboat pier.
- A system has been used to reserve the shed/deck area for private events: Put a note up stating when you will be using it. It's that simple and works.
- Nick Tonkery gave a report of a Fremont Township meeting that addressed the possibility of a township wide refuse collector. No decisions have been made, as it would need to be voted on after petitions are signed to get it on a ballot. Other areas have accomplished this with lower rates and most important reduced traffic from heavy trucks. Currently we have two collectors that travel each pick up day for garbage and then for recycled items, in very large trucks.

Thank you to all board members who VOLUNTEER their time. We welcome the new ones and remind everyone that we are VOLUNTEERS...we spend a lot of time planning and implementing projects and improvements. Please thank your neighbors for all the time they donate to make this such a special place to live. Offer to pitch in...every hand makes the jobs easier. Railroad sale to CN Will have impact close to Home

The EJ&E railroad sale to Canadian National reportedly may increase freight train traffic by 4 to 5 times. Two of the crossings that will see an increase in car traffic delays are Gilmer Road, just south of Sylvan Lake, and IL Highway 60/83 near Diamond Lake Road.

The proposal would shift CN freight traffic onto the 198-mile EJ&E line, which runs in an arc from Waukegan to Joliet to northwest Indiana. Much of that freight comes from overseas through the railroad's Canadian ports.



General ice thickness guidelines When is ice safe?

There really is no sure answer. You can't judge the strength of ice just by its appearance, age, thickness, temperature, or whether or not the ice is covered with snow. Strength is based on all these factors -- plus the depth of water under the ice, size of the water body, water chemistry and currents, the distribution of the load on the ice, and local climatic conditions.

As a general rule for new, clear ice only:

- * 2" or less STAY OFF
- * 4" Ice fishing or other activities on foot

Enjoy the lake this winter, hope for a smooth freeze and BE SAFE!

was also supervising the installation of the basketball backstop and helping a neighbor with their driveway drainage problem AND bringing the generator to the event.



Leaf Burning

This may be a little late for this year but it may be of help next year or during spring clean-up.

Around the lake we have the usual leaf burning in the street. We ask people to clean up the ashes before the next rain washes things into the storm sewers and from there into the lake. Other suggested guidelines are:

- Be courteous and respectful to your neighbors, especially those with breathing problems. Let them know before you burn.
- Do not burn on windy days, or days when the wind blows towards your neighbors.
- Do not burn wet leaves. Smoke from such fires stays closer to the ground and longer in the breathing zone.
- The best time of day to burn is from mid-morning to mid-afternoon. The smoke clears the fastest at this time of day.
- If you can, burn several small fires instead of one large fire. The leaves will burn faster this way, reducing air pollution.
- Always attend, manage and control your fire. Always have a hose or water source nearby.
- Do not burn in ditches, drainage ways or within 25 feet of a body of water.
- Open burning of anything other than yard waste, such as garbage, is not permitted.
