


SLIA Annual Meeting - 2011

Good News/Bad News Dam update:

Here is the good news! Design plans for the rehabilitation of the dam are being finalized by Highway Commissioner Bill Grinnell and his consulting engineer. Some of the key work items being planned are:

- replacing the culvert and spillway
- relocating a sewer pipe
- sheet piling reinforcement
- timber guardrail
- pavement resurfacing with curbs from the bridge to Midlothian Road
- boulder covered slope on the east side of the dam

It is too early to predict a start date since State agencies must first review the plans and issue permits. The project must then be advertised for bidding.

Here is the bad news! The lake will have to be lowered by about 6 feet and the Highland access closed to traffic during construction. However, this will present a good opportunity to perform shoreline maintenance, cleanup and protection. The goal is to avoid significant lake use impacts, especially during the summer of next year, 2012.

There will certainly be inconveniences, but the Board of Directors will do it's best to keep everyone informed. We will pass on pertinent information by email and the web site to give everyone as much notice as possible.





Midlothian Rd Resurfacing

President of the Sylvan Lake Improvement Association, Steve Magnusen, contacted IDOT with a request to include removal and replacement of the paved shoulder on the westerly side of Midlothian south of Highland Drive. Steve included a photo showing the broken-up condition of this 6-8' wide shoulder. In addition, we also request replacement of the curb at the NW corner of Highland. This barrier curb is broken and should be replaced. The loose and irregular asphalt create a hazard. If that length cannot be added, we respectfully request the addition of the 8' paved shoulder between S. Sylvan and Highland, which ia about 540 linear feet.

In reply to Steves request IDOT indicated that they will include repaying the Midlothian shoulder between S. Sylvan and Highland, but will have to limit shoulder work from S. Sylvan to Gilmer to "clean up" (stone regarding) only. IDOT also said that they would look at the Highland corner curb but made no promises.

The beach

The beach at Sylvan Lake is meant for use by homeowners and their families and friends.

We are occasionally having issues with young people – middle and late-teenage years – who are coming to the beach without their families and bringing many friends with them. Problems happen when these friends are loud and raucous, sometimes drinking and smoking, sometimes taking over the pier, and sadly often using language that other beachgoers don't want around their small kids. There are reports of families leaving the beach to



avoid the unpleasant exposure. It has happened often enough that the SLIA Board feels it needs to be addressed.

This is during the day. We have separate issues with kids coming out at night and using the beach when it's closed. But this has become an issue during the daytime hours.

Some private lakes have paid security personnel for these reasons. Private security is very expensive. The SLIA Board would like to avoid such expense if possible.

We need homeowners to discuss this with their kids. It comes down to a matter of responsibility and respect. Ask them to bring only a few friends at a time to the beach, and then show consideration for other people at the beach with their behavior. Remember, the Lake Rules and Regulations (available on the SLIA website) require that children under age 15 be accompanied by an adult.

When not accompanied by an adult homeowner, ask your teenagers to bring no more than 3 or 4 friends with them to the beach. If a largeer group of teenagers are going to use the beach, there needs to be a parent present to monitor the group.

We have operated as a Neighborhood Watch community for many years. If you see people you do not know, especially if they do not appear to know the rules of the beach, you can direct them to the rules sign. Also, if you ask them for information, you can ask who they are visiting and confirm whether or not the Sylvan Lake member is present in their group. You can then call a board member and describe the group size and behavior that brought them to your attention. The board will contact the homeowner.

During the recent power outages I was contacted by a constituent asking if there were any provisions to notify emergency personnel of disabled or people who may require special consideration in order to access services. I have been in contact with Countryside Fire, Grayslake Fire and Mundelein Fire Departments regarding this issue. Each Fire Department said there is a process to notify them. Please contact your local fire department to enroll.

Your information will be entered into the Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) database. When a telecommunicator types in an address and an Illinois Premise Alert has been attached to that address, the telecommunicator will observe extra information about any special needs.



Drowning Doesn't Look Like Drowning

May we all remember and learn from this tragedy at Sylvan Lake

One year ago Matt Rogan, 21, son of Tom and Tammy Rogan, drowned at the beach during our 4th of July picnic celebration despite the best efforts of a number of people around him and several lake residents trained in emergency CPR. There is very little splashing, no waving, and no yelling or calls for help of any kind. It is the number two cause of accidental death in children, age 15 and under (just behind vehicle accidents)

Drowning does not look like drowning - instinctive drowning response like this:

- 1. Except in rare circumstances, drowning people are physiologically unable to call out for help.
- 2. Drowning people's mouths alternately sink below and reappear above the surface of the water.
- **3.** Drowning people cannot wave for help.
- **4.** Throughout the Instinctive Drowning Response, drowning people cannot voluntarily control their arm movements.
- **5.** From beginning to end of the Instinctive Drowning Response people's bodies remain upright in the water, with no evidence of a supporting kick.



This doesn't mean that a person that is yelling for help and thrashing isn't in real trouble – they are experience aquatic distress.

Look for these other signs of drowning when persons are n the water:

- Head low in the water, mouth at water level
- Head tilted back with mouth open
- Eyes glassy and empty, unable to focus
- · Eyes closed
- Hair over forehead or eyes
- Not using legs Vertical
- Hyperventilating or gasping
- Trying to swim in a particular direction but not making headway
- Trying to roll over on the back
- Ladder climb, rarely out of the water.

One way to be sure? Ask them: "Are you alright?"

If they can answer at all – they probably are ok. If they return a blank stare – you may have less than 30 seconds to get to them. And parents: children playing in the water make noise. When they get quiet, you get to them and find out why.

Important Reminder

Please Slow Down

We have a very active community we bike ride, we walk or run, we push our kids in strollers and have the older ones unsteady on their new two-wheeler pedal



along in front of us. We walk our dogs and stop and talk to neighbors. We do all of this in the street.

Our beautiful, active community has no sidewalks - so the only place to do these activities is in the street.

Driving at a speed that might seem "slow enough" is not safe enough for our neighborhood. Particularly dangerous areas include the blind curve nicknamed "dead man's curve" (for a reason) and any stretch of road with parked cars that block the driver's view of pedestrians (which is pretty much everywhere!) Please use caution on our streets for the safety of all - drive slower than you think you need to and remind the new drivers in your family to do the same thing.
