Sylvan Lake Boat Progress

With the help of many volunteers we have successfully been able to clean up some of our easements and beach area of abandoned boats. As of mid-June there have been a total of 8 boats that have been identified as abandoned and have or are heading to the dumpster during the months of June and July. Out of the 8 abandoned boats only one was found to be seaworthy and was claimed by a member of Sylvan Lake. A boat sticker and storage form was completed and submitted for it. I'd like to shout out a special thank you to Cliff Gartner and his son. We also want to thank Gary Goldblatt, Debbie Wawrzyniak and the men that were at the June 16th Happy Hour at the beach, for carrying, dragging and lifting the first set of abandoned boats out of easements and the side of the beach house and into the dumpster. In addition, some Sylvan Lake members have been evaluating their own boats and determining that they may not need them and are finding other families within the community that could use them.

This project has been very successful as we have implemented our team solutions. We are identifying our boats, and we have installed storage racks at the beach and Ravinia easement. In addition, we are cleaning up the beach area and some of the easements of abandoned boats. Moving forward we will continue to listen to our community for suggestions on improving the boat identification and storage process here at Sylvan Lake and considering additional storage at the beach and other easements as the process identifies the need.

Security at Sylvan Lake

Door-to-Door Salespeople Now Required to Have Certification

We in unincorporated Lake County now have some additional security provided by the Lake County Government. Solicitors seeking door-to-door purchases or orders are required to comply with a County Board adopted ordinance when working in unincorporated Lake County.

Each solicitor must:

- Work only between the hours of 11 am and 7 pm.
- Carry his/her own Certificate of Registration bearing the sales person's name, employer's name, manufacturer's name, type of business, and an embossed seal.
- Observe "No Solicitation" signs.
- Respect occupant's request if asked to leave.

Residents should ask to see the vendor's certificate and report any violations to the Lake County Sheriff's office (847.549.5200) where fines and penalties can be enforced.

This ordinance applies only to unincorporated Lake County and provides exemptions for religious groups, candidates, and minors under the age of eighteen who participate in fundraising activities.

Greetings fellow Sylvan Lakers! What a fast summer! All the seasons are great at Sylvan Lake.

Thank you Garden Club and all volunteers for putting on a great July 4th event at the Beach. Most attended in recent years.

The SLIA board has been busy working on Octoberfest, 2018 budget, prioritizing projects and approving expenditures. In 2018, we look to update the SLIA rules and regulations to be more in line with Lake county ordinances and HOA standards.

The Boat sticker and storage process continues to evolve and has already shown early signs of success by the reduction of boats along the beach this year over last, giving members more sandy beach to enjoy. (We've received \$700.00 in sticker and storage fees, and 104 boat stickers issued)

As we continue to move forward with infrastructure improvements, which by the way are costly, our need for volunteers will remain high to help keep the costs down. Volunteers are not age restricted..... Did you know that Association fees are outpacing home prices (Money magazine). HOA fees have risen almost twice as fast as home prices over the past decade, according to Trulia. The fees, which cover shared property maintenance, repairs, insurance and association responsibilities, jumped to \$331 a MONTH on average in 2015. That's almost 32% higher than 10 years earlier...

What do we pay at Sylvan Lake....\$300.00 a YEAR. Amazing compared to averages.

- *1986-Assessements set at \$100.00 (eagle scouts began several major projects throughout easements)
- *additional increases over years to \$300.00 per year

- *1951-Swings installed at Point Comfort park

- *1963-Weekend beach patrol costs \$1.25 per hour
- *1969- sewers installed
- *1974-Playground equipment at Schwerman park updated

PIERS:Couple of things to note about piers on Sylvan Lake. Member piers must be pre- approved by the board and must be built in compliance with SLIA rules and regulations under section 4 of Common Property policy.

Homeowners who have lake access across SLIA Easements are not allowed to build piers. These would be considered on SLIA property and if someone (3rdParty) is hurt on the pier built on SLIA property, both owner of the pier/dock and SLIA may be brought into a bodily injury claim. Best advice...ask before doing something that you may be asked to remove.

Parks and Easements

Maple Park

Maple Park has about 300' of shoreline that a few homes border. This shoreline is very eroded, with chunks of land falling into the lake as well as old RR ties that were installed over 30 years ago in an attempt to curb erosion there.

Large pipe was used to secure these RR ties and they are exposed. Old tires used as bumpers on piers are in the water.

Maple Park is also a recipient of some of the fastest water entering Sylvan Lake, which is why this erosion occurs.

In May, Debbie Wawrzyniak, who lives on the bay across from this area and I met with Integrated Lakes Management who also does our herbiciding in Maple Park and Ravina. We discussed the scope of the improvements we would like to see and have received quotes. Debbie also met with Applied Ecological Services, but has not received quotes from them.

It will cost upwards of approximately \$20,000-\$30,000 for this work which involves remove all the debris: RR ties, old pipe, tires. Then reshaping the shoreline, possibly adding boulders, and installing deep rooted native plants to retain soil. Seeding will also be done.

All work would be done from the water side, not on land. A special vessel is now available that will haul away debris and also bring in new materials to be used.

We are also planning on addressing the boat storage and shoreline usage while we save up for this.

We have to save \$\$ for this project, however in the meantime we are asking that the homeowners bordering this shoreline stop mowing all the way to the edge. Please leave 4-6 feet to grow. If ugly or invasive plants emerge, we can deal with that as it happens.

There are native species, in the form of seed banks left over from 10-15 years ago when we planted many native deep rooted plants.

Left alone, those seeds will grow into plants and their roots will also go deep holding the soil once again.

We must begin this process this summer. Once the shoreline is rehabbed, it will have that same appearance, it is techinally called a Buffer Zone. Very simple, but has great benefits.



JOB PROGRESS AND COMMENTS

We pulled and chemically treated invasive species at both Ravinia and Maple Parks. The first pass through the site was very successful leaving few herbaceous species. We found only one Dame's rocket and minimal other species. We selectively sprayed relatively small nonnative woody species making sure not to over-spray or drift onto vegetation below. The worst woody species at these two sites is high-bush cranberry while the worst herbaceous species at this time of year are sow thistle and queen Anne's lace. Creeping Charlie is also on the rise. We targeted remaining garlic mustard, dame's rocket, and reed canary grass and made sure to look out for rosettes. We were as thorough as time allowed with the intention of not damaging the lush native vegetation present. These sites are in good condition and host a diversity of native species. We saw an abundance of joe pye weed, harebell, and bottlebrush grass, and were glad to see ironwood and culver's root among a plethora of other species. There are a fair amount of relatively large woody species that are too big to treat chemically at this time of year. A quick selective clearing and stump treatment, or basal bark treatment, would benefit these sites greatly.
