

The SLIA board completed our first-quarter project by approving the revised and updated SLIA Rules and Regulations. We plan on communicating these Rules and Regs via E-blast as well as direct mail to the 10 or 12 members for whom we have no e-mail address. In addition, we will post the Rules & Regs on the SLIA website – www.slia.net . This completes the cycle of updating and revising our By- laws and Rules and Regs to align them with Illinois Association Law as well as local county and nearby municipal ordinances. Additionally, some items changed in the Rules & Regs pertaining only to Sylvan Lake. The next phase of implementation will be the execution of conformance. It is the objective of the Association to maintain the Property as a first-class residential community and to make living in Sylvan Lake a positive and enjoyable experience for all residents. In adopting these Rules, the Association is seeking to facilitate the efficient operation of the Property, protect the rights and interests of all Owners and residents, and promote harmonious community living. The SLIA Association Board thanks owners and residents for their compliance.

Gilmer Road to Close for Culvert Replacement, June 7-July 6

Gilmer Rd Detour



The Lake County Division of Transportation (LCDOT) will be closing Gilmer Road, from Midlothian Road to Diamond Lake Road, to through traffic starting Thursday, June 7 at 6 a.m. and will reopen the afternoon of Friday, July 6. The closure is necessary to replace a culvert south of Sequoia Road. Local traffic will have access to Sequoia Road from the north and access to Darlington Drive from the south.

Detour Route: Midlothian Road to IL Route 60/83 to Diamond Lake Road.

Look for Beebalm, Coneflower, Asters, Virgin's Bower, Golden Alexander, Liatris, Anise Hyssop, Little Blue Stem, Cup Plant, Prairie drop seed, and Elm leaf Goldenrod. Get the Lead Out

Hello Neighbors!

This is a warning for fisherman about the dangers of using lead-based tackle! Wisconsin DNR has put out a lot of warnings regarding this problem. Since we have some new visitors (loons) who are enjoying on our lake, we need to be aware of the problem. Thank you!

Reasons to use lead-free fishing tackle



Start the summer right by switching to lead-free fishing tackle for the Minnesota fishing opener.

Get the lead out - One lead split shot - enough to kill a twelve pound loon!

Lead poisoning from ingested tackle usually occurs in one of two ways, a lead jig head is swallowed by a fish, or lost lead tackle is picked up along with small stones and grit from the bottom of lakes to help digest food. Fish, loons, eagles, trumpeter swans and many other wildlife species are consuming lead in one or both of these ways, and the results can be fatal.

Baltimore Oriole

Did you see the Baltimore Orioles as they migrated north and stopped for a rest in Sylvan Lake? They are a beauti-



ful bird, about the size of a Robin.

WARNING: Unlawful Speeds on Sylvan Lake Streets Will Be Pursued

Speed limit signs at the entrances of the Sylvan Lake subdivision are posted as 20 MPH for the whole subdivision.

Speeding cars and commercial vehicles on the streets of Sylvan Lake pose a big threat to our community. Sylvan Lake has no sidewalks, creating a substandard situation with our streets being used as sidewalks. Small children on bikes get ahead of their parents, who are then horrified to see a vehicle coming toward their toddlers much too fast and sometimes much too close.

Anyone who sees a speeding vehicle is welcome to call the Sheriff at 847-377-4000. The Sheriff has offered to come into the lake and issue citations to random vehicles caught speeding. If you don't that to happen to you, maintain the speed limit.

Earth-friendly Yard Maintenance. From the Eco Chicks

Wild Ones: Gardening with native plants is good for pollinators, birds, and keeping our lake clean and healthy. If you would like to learn more, consider attending a Wild Ones meeting. On June 5, Meredith Tucker, Citizens for Conservation will present: Earth-friendly Yard Maintenance. On July 10, Tom Simpson, Field Station Ecologist at McHenry Conservation District will present: The Role of Squirrels and Blue Jays in Oak Reproduction. Meetings are held on the first Tuesday of each month at Fremont Library in Mundelein at 7pm. Nonmembers are always welcome. For more information: https:// laketoprairie.wildones.org/

Things all of us can take care of, Sylvan Lake and the people who use it:

- 1. Don't over-fertilize your lawn and choose phosphorus-free fertilizers. Most lawns have enough phosphorus anyway and excess washes into waterways and contributes to algae blooms. Avoid fertilizing before a heavy rain to minimize fertilizer run-off.
- 2. Avoid using Round-up and other herbicides or use them as sparingly as possible. Learn more about the concerns: https://news.nationalgeographic.com/2015/04/150422-glyphosateroundup-herbicide-weeds/
- 3. Reconsider your use of mosquito and other insect control chemicals. Dragonflies are rock stars when it comes to mosquito control. The larvae feed on mosquito larvae and adult dragonflies feed on adult mosquitoes so make your property dragonfly friendly. Dragonflies like vegetation that grows out of the water or near the water with flat rocks nearby for sunning themselves.

- 4. If you are making some additions to your landscape, **consider choosing native plants.** They have deeper root systems than other ornamentals so they require less watering and tending once established, prevent erosion, support native pollinators and birds and more.
- 5. When cleaning your boats, use water only. Detergents and chemical products are damaging to our fish and other wildlife.
- 6. **Dispose of pet waste properly.**Leaving it in easements or on other surfaces means that it will eventually wash into the lake.

Please be considerate of everyone who uses Sylvan Lake. Any product that isn't appropriate to add to a child's pool doesn't belong in our lake! Thanks for doing your part to make this a great summer.

JOB PROGRESS AND COMMENTS

The purpose for todays visit was to complete the initial herbicide application of the season in both Ravinia and Maple Parks. The target species for today included Dames Rocket, Reed Canary Grass, and Garlic Mustard.

A 3% solution of AquaPro was applied to target species via backpack sprayer. There were greater populations of Garlic Mustard at Maple Park and greater populations of Dames Rocket at Ravinia Park. Reed Canary Grass was observed in both locations but was more prominent in Ravinia Park. Some native species observed today included Trout Lilies, Bloodroot, Dutchman's Breeches, Large Flower Trillium, Prairie Trillium, Wild Geraniums, and Mayapples.

In the future, another herbicide visit can occur to ensure that invasive species populations are under control. Day lilies and other garden cultivars were observed within the unit; action may be taken to control these species in the future so that natives can persist.

We are learning the hard way that controlling mosquitoes with fogging yards is also killing the pollinators. Please reconsider this practice. 1 out of every 3 bites of food we eat is made possible by pollinators, not to mention flowers and trees. Last fall "someone" herbicided a swath through Maple Park. Please do not do this without asking a board member. Round Up or anything that you can buy at a hardware store is not what is used by the service that selectively herbicides for us. In other words, we don't know what was used, was it safe for humans? not to mention the pollinators we are trying to attract here. When a bee or humming bird lands on or brushes against something that has been herbicided with Round Up, it becomes impaired.

We will be publishing more about insecticides, herbicides with relation to humans and plants.

known, cleared out buckthorn along the fenceline of No. Sylvan and then came back and planted native flowering seed. A few areas we roped off and put signs on, not to mow or disturb. It wasn't long after all this hard work that 'someone' removed the roping and signage. WHY? This is NOT cool folks. ECO-CORNER#3 - NOXIOUS WEED or INVASIVE?











Such ugly words for attractive plants!

Planting and maintaining vegetable or flower gardens can be a very satisfying hobby. When plants are fully mature, they flower, fruit, and fulfill their reproduction cycle by ripening the next generation of seeds in order to propagate. While this germination-to-maturity cycle seems to take forever when we are tending to intentional plantings, we should also recognize how quickly some plants have a tendency to mature, reseed, and spread ... and become noxious invaders.

INVASIVE PLANTS inhibit, block, and restrict native plants from surviving and thriving and ultimately upset the ecological balance critical to a healthy, sustainable natural environment. NOXIOUS WEEDS are damaging in some way to public health, crops, livestock, land or other property. Just because pollinators are seen on the plants, colorful flowers are noticed, or berries provide food for wildlife doesn't mean those types of plants should be allowed to grow unchecked. Prolific reseeding, few natural pests to control growth, and an adaptability to grow in lessthan-desirable ground are some common characteristics that give clues that a plant is likely or potentially a NOXIOUS or INVASIVE SPECIES.

*** Quick reminder: do NOT compost invasive plants or noxious weeds!

Purple Loosestrife (photo on left): Pretty purple flowering plants occasionally pop up in the marshy areas around Sylvan Lake, and each plant can produce up to 2.5 million seeds per year! The seeds are easily distributed by both wind, water, and even mud tracked to other areas by humans and animals, and because the plants form dense colonies, Purple Loosestrife crowds out native vegetation above and below the water line and provides little benefit to wildlife. INVASIVE.

Bush Honeysuckle (second from left photo): These are very common around our Sylvan Lake neighborhood areas. The honeysuckle plant that is native to Illinois is a vine - not a woody bush. Yes, those overgrown honeysuckle bushes that do flower white, pink, or yellow can screen an undesirable view, and yes, birds and other wildlife do eat the berries produced in the summer. However, the Bush Honeysuckle greatly interferes with the understory in a healthy native Illinois woodland ecosystem. INVASIVE.

Canada Thistle (middle photo): This prickly perennial plant is visited by many pollinators, and birds are also attracted to the purple flower heads and seeds. It is very difficult to eradicate once established. A mature plant has roots which can extend 15 feet or more horizontally and vertical roots may grow 6 to 15 feet deep! Canada Thistle is classified in Illinois as a NOXIOUS WEED and control of this plant is required by Illinois law.

Dame's Rocket (second from right): No, this is not the Phlox we want in our gardens! Currently this plant only poses a potential threat to our Illinois ecosystems, but Wisconsin already classifies Dame's Rocket as INVASIVE. The flowers have four petals, and the plants produce an over-abundance of seeds that enables new Dame's Rocket colonies to grow in all kinds of dry and wet, shady and sunny environments. It is also related to another plant that Illinois has been battling for years ...

Garlic Mustard (far right photo): Related to Dame's Rocket and definitely on the Illinois list of INVA-SIVE plant species. This plant has aggressively invaded many Illinois woodland areas and out-competes native vegetation - including newly sprouted trees! Salamanders, butterflies, and other beneficial soil organisms are disrupted by colonies of garlic mustard and the different chemicals it secretes. Ew. Pull it.
