Road work on Sylvan Dr South


W Sylvan South and its curbs will be replaced in the upcoming project which is being bid out in conjunction with Lake County for the Gilmer/ Midlothian Improvements.

Good Information:

Did you know that Dames Rocket that's blooming now is considered to be an invasive species that are already established in the state and cause or have the potential to



cause significant environmental or economic harm?

Another invasive species that is blooming now is Garlic Mustard. It has aggressively invaded numerous forested natural areas and is capable of dominating the ground layer

in many areas. It is a severe threat to many natural areas where it occurs because of its ability to grow to the exclusion of other herbaceous species.

If you see these plants, please pull them out and throw them out as yard waste.




Did you know that the chemicals used to kill **mosquitoes** can also kill good insects such as honeybees, ladybugs, fireflies, and butterflies. **Spraying** can harm you, your kids, pets, and your neighbors. The chemicals can also harm birds, bats, and insects that help eat **mosquitos** and pollinate your yard. If you choose to use professional sprayers, they have strategies, such as standing with their back to the property line and **working** with the wind, to minimize the drift of chemicals into non-target areas.

Please remember you cannot spray into the easement areas!

ECO-CORNER #18

Sylvan (Impoundment) Lake ... what does that even mean?

We know that Sylvan Lake here in Lake County is more than the official facts that were listed in the recent Shoreline. We have visual beauty captured and shared in stunning photographs, fun recreational sports enjoyed by all ages such as swimming, kayaking, or fishing, and we can't forget our memory-making community activities like 4th of July Celebration and Carp-O-Rama. There is also more for us to learn about Sylvan Lake as an impoundment lake that might inform and guide how we protect the health of this body of water and continue to enjoy this awesome community asset for years to come.

An 'impoundment lake' is generally defined as a standing body of water intentionally constructed by humans or unintentionally imposed by nature. An example of an impoundment lake created by humans is when a dam is built to trap and contain a body of water ~ that's our Sylvan Lake. Nature can also create and trap (or impound) a body of water, for example, when large trees fall across a small stream and slow or stop the movement of water which then forms a pond habitat as the water backs up.

The Sylvan Lake dam was built almost one hundred years ago and works to both retain and regulate the amount of water collected from direct snow and rain precipitation, surface run-off from our yards and

neighborhood areas, and in-flow from other nearby developments. Residents' volunteer efforts and Board-approved lake management contractors have been involved in overseeing the general health of Sylvan Lake for decades, and over the past few years, the health of Sylvan Lake has come more into focus.

Both surface and below the waterline factors can affect the water quality and the overall self-sustaining health of an impoundment lake ecosystem. The surface elements of a small, man-made lake like Sylvan Lake would be the shoreline, wind/wave agitation or stillness, and the sun/shade areas among other aspects. Below the waterline happenings also interrelate with the surface and might include the water depth and differing temperatures, the aquatic life made up of plants and other live organisms, and the unseen currents and movement of water.

Sylvan Lake is special, and many of you reading the Shoreline have grown up here with happy memories, perhaps returned here after a time away, and there are other neighbors still unpacking recent moving boxes. However, as an impoundment lake, Sylvan Lake is particularly susceptible to being over-impacted by decades of human activity and development. Future Eco-Corner articles will take a deeper dive (haha) into the different factors that affect the lake health.

Largest Carp: Rich Borst, 7.73 (beat out 2nd place by 0.05 lbs) Most Carp Caught: 20 Carp by Gary Love



Parks & Easements

Way back In 2007, Ravinia
Park was restored by removing
invasive plants such as European
Buckthorn, Norway maple trees,
purple loosestrife, garlic mustard &
crazy vines. We then applied for and
received an IEPA grant to do some
excavation and install 2 detention
ponds to hold water and settle out
sedimentation there rather than in the
lake.

Over the past 10 years, flow (run-off) has increased from more development happening along Gilmer Rd., causing this flow to move much faster and as a result it was bypassing the ponds. The last 4 years made this clear because the ponds were nearly empty regardless of rainfall. The solution was to redirect the flow back to the ponds and shore them up with large rip rap.

There are 5 areas along the creek that were reinforced with some larger boulders.

The rip rap won't move and it will also collect sediment in addition to the ponds. Seed blowing around from the new seeding of surrounding areas will also get caught in the muddy rip rap and take root. In a few seasons most of the rip won't be bright white anymore.

After this excavation was completed, all the areas disturbed were seeded with native species, with the exception of Oak Terrace as this was restored with grass seed. There is also a strip from the step area leading to the lake that is a mix of turf and native species.


It took a bit longer for the seedings

to emerge due to very little spring rains. But it has finally happened and people can now go into this area to use their boats or just to take a walk and view the newly formed pattern.

Integrated Lakes Mgt (ILM) did this project. They are the same contractor as Maple Park shoreline restoration that was done 2 years ago.

They had to dismantle part the steps on Oak Terrace for their excavator to have access. When it was all over they reinstalled the steps and also installed a new post for the Oak Terrace sign as the old one was rotten at the bottom and simply fell over when they attempted to remove it!

Getting to know your neighbor Stan Rak

Interview with Stan Rak, May 2, 2021 Written by: Peggy Delacruz

I was looking forward to sitting out on the deck overlooking the lake to talk to Stan about his life here at Sylvan Lake. His house sits atop a hill that slopes down to the water's edge. Sitting on the deck, you can enjoy an east view of the lake. It's a spectacular, breathtaking view. This particular afternoon happened to be rather warm and windy, so, instead, we sat at a quaint iron patio table with matching chairs in a screened porch attached to his house. Stan told me that the screened in porch was one of the best decisions he made. I think a screened in porch is almost always a good idea in Illinois, but especially in this case. The porch sits on the side of the house, on a quiet lot, surrounded by shrubs and trees that have been here longer than some of us have.

The first things I asked Stan were how long he has lived in Sylvan Lake and what brought him here. Stan has lived here 62 years. He celebrated his 90th birthday in September. He began to tell me in great detail about the decision for him and his late wife Rita to relocate from Chicago to Sylvan Lake. His attention to detail throughout his stories and ability to recall exact dates was not only impressive but made the conversation so interesting.

In the winter of 1958, Rita and Stan were both living in an apartment in downtown Chicago. Stan was getting frustrated driving 45 minutes to get to work everyday which was only 16 blocks away from where they lived. They both enjoyed visiting Wisconsin on the weekends so they decided to look for a home on a lake somewhere in Illinois. One Sunday afternoon they were driving in the area, cut through South Sylvan and saw a Real Estate Sign. They called the Realtor who told them there was only one house available and that it had been vacant for two years. The Realtor didn't know the owners and wasn't even sure how to contact them. This was December of 1958. Stan got a call from the Realtor early in '59 who told them he found the sellers. Stan and Rita made an offer for the house in March. Stan stayed in the house to get it ready while Rita stayed in Chicago where she was working for a lawyer. She joined him 3 months later.

This is how the rest of our conversation went:

Peggy Delacruz: You must have seen some physical changes in Sylvan Lake over the years. What are the

biggest changes you have seen?

Stan Rak: (without missing a beat Stan answered) The sewage system that was put in to accommodate the conventional houses. That was a big improvement. The Roads were owned by the Sylvan Lake Association. They were dirt roads that were covered with pea gravel and tar. They did that until Fremont Township took over the roads and blacktopped it. Gas was a big improvement because prior to the gas, which I think came in the middle to late 60's I had oil heat and the furnace would always clonk out and Rita would call me at work, "Its getting cold in the house". (Stan laughs while telling me this). Prior to Gas there was electric hot water, electric kitchen range, electric dryer, clothes dryer. Everything was electric so the electric bill was always pretty high.

PDLC: Every year Sylvan Lake holds the Fourth of July Picnic, Octoberfest, etc. Were there any other traditions that Sylvan Lake had that got lost over the years?

SR: Ok, there was the Winter Club. That was to support the road activity because we maintained the roads ourselves. We hired a farmer to plow the roads and so we had to generate some money and so we passed a hat to put some money in. It wasn't much, twenty dollars a year, but it covered our expenses for maintaining the roads....Oh, pardon me, the Association covered the roads also.... and the big event for the Winter Club was.... we had a dance in the winter time ... maybe in January or February... at the Fire station. We would generally get about 50 people that we wouldn't see all winter because they came out only in the summer. A lot of people did that....they came out on the weekends in the summer. But for the dance we got everybody together in the winter time and it was an enjoyable event. Now there are too many people on the lake today to have it

at the fire station...but it would be nice if they resumed the annual dance.....it doesn't necessarily have to be in the winter. Ernie Washburn and I headed up the Winter Club...collecting the money. There were a few people who never paid their dues. We were still friends. We figured....if they could't afford it....so what.....

PDLC: You and Rita raised two children here. What are their names and what are some of your best memories of your kids growing up in Sylvan Lake?

SR: Stanton was born in '62 and Sheryl was born in '68. The memories of what was enjoyable...was just seeing them enjoy all the freedom with safety.... like the park across the street....Rita could work in the kitchen and look out the window and keep an eye out on the children. Stanton used to wander off. There were a lot of empty lots with heavy woods on it and he'd build tents or something like that, away from home and we could check on him to see if he was ok ..but there was never any mischief of any sort. Just growing up in nature. Across the street was the Chicago Park District Tree Nursery. Stanton belonged to the Boy Scouts. The Scout leader was the guy who belonged to the nursery so we would have the whole nursery to ourselves for scout events..... There was a facility where you could shoot rifles so the kids got some experience with firearms. We felt like the kids were always safe here on the lake. We always felt like we were up north because it was all farms. There were no houses or projects in the area. It was strictly a country atmosphere. Cows....we had cows in our yard at times. We'd come home from somewhere and there would be a cow in the yard. They had a barn on the corner where the Cherry Hill is. There were cows there and they would wander up and get into the community here.

PDLC: Wow! I didn't know there was a place to shoot firearms.

SR: (laughs a friendly laugh)

PDLC: Did your kids attend Fremont?

SR: Yes. I think Fremont opened maybe 5-10 years before we moved here. Before that, there was something down by Indian Creek Road. There was a school building that they used but we weren't a part of that. Then it shut down and Fremont opened up.

PDLC: Where are your kids now? Are they close by? Far away?

SR: (Smiling and with a tone that reflected a happy and proud heart he said) Stanton retired the first of this year. He has a P.H.D from the University of Minnesota, in Chemistry. He worked for Motorola. His division at Motorola was purchased by Continental. It's a German company. Its pronounced Con-tee-nen-TAL. He spent four years in Germany. He married a lady from Germany and now he's back here and he's retired with his bride. Sheryl got her Master's Degree in Computer Engineering. Her and her husband formed a business which they both work in now. They both have separate responsibilities but they work together.

PDLC: Do you have grandchildren?

SR: I do...I have two. Emily and Adam. Emily is 25 and Adam is 23. Sheryl and her husband have been married over 25 years now.

PDLC: That's wonderful.... Many people who live in Sylvan Lake know that Rita was a big part of this community ...she was very involved in the Garden Club and traditionally greeted new members of the community with her infamous Kalochkies. What is something that you can share with us that people might be surprised to know about her?

SR: (There is a silence and Stan is thinking... With a soft, kind voice he says) I don't think this will be a surprise but she loved people. She did it just because she loved people. Let's see, what would they be surprised to know about her? EHH...I don't think there is anything....she would do anything, she loved everybody. I never heard her put down anybody.

PDLC: Awe. Thats really sweet...(silence)

PDLC: And....would you be willing to share, someday, with our community, Rita's secret Kolachi recipe?

SR: (laughs a big, happy, laugh) I think it sneaked out. A few people at the events have presented me with a tray of kolzachkies and said they were Ritas recipe..... so....it's in circulation...apparently....(smiling).....I think it came from my mother.

PDLC: Stan, did you serve in the Military or the Army?

SR: Army. I served from '54-'56. I served two full years to the day. I was discharged at Ft. Sheridan. I spent one year in Germany. Prior to that I was in Basic Training in Ft. Leonard Wood, Missouri. From there I went to medical training in San Antonio Texas. (Ft. Sam Houston).

PDLC: Do you have any interesting Army stories?

SR: Well....I think every guy should serve in the

Army. I think it's a great education. The experience..... before you set your life on a track.....because you get to meet a lot of people in a lot of situations...that you would never encounter in civilian life. You get to travel a lot, usually....you have that.....I spent many months in central Missouri in basic training and then San Antonio Texas. I lived in Germany and my last three months was in Beckley West Virginia. I just think the Army is a great experience for anyone. I went in after six years of graduate school so I wasn't as in good physical shape to keep up with 17 year olds. We'd march to a rifle range 13 miles there and 15 miles back.....the kids would never tire out. But I was 23 (laughs) ...I was getting to be an old man (laughs again).

PDLC: What was your career before you retired?

SR: Oh... Culligan. I worked for them for 35 years. While I was there I invented and wrote several patents. I don't own them but was an inventor.

PDLC: That's impressive Stan.

SR: If you google Stanley F. Rak, you will find them

PDLC: You said Rita worked outside the home?

SR: She worked a total of about 6 years... I think. She worked a couple of years out of Chicago and about 3 or 4 years here. She worked until Stanton came along... that was '62. And then she left because of the pregnancy.

PDLC: Are there any hobbies that you have that you want to talk about? Cooking or gardening or reading....?

SR: A lot of the lake people know I have a greenhouse. I can show you later. I've had that greenhouse since 1975. I've recently sort of worn out of the enthusiasm. I used to start seedlings. I also had a hobby of raising cactus plants. I've also lost my enthusiasm for that but the plants have survived....in spite of me. (laughs)

PDLC: So you still have the plants you started from seedings?

SR: Yes, I can show you. And photography..... photography was not only a hobby of mine, it got me through some school....I'd do it for the school newspaper or the yearbook and I'd pay my tuition with it. And as a kid my father did photography....he built a darkroom in the basement and I took it over when I was about 7 years old. So I have thousands of pictures in files and things like that. Before digital photography came to be, I took black and white photography classes at the High School.

PDLC: I love that....

PDLC: Did Rita have any hobbies?

SR: Periodically she loved to sew things. She had a sewing machine that she used quite a bit to make things with....clothing of various sorts....cooking....she loved cooking different meals....and things of that nature..... people was her biggest hobby. She loved people. She loved getting involved with people doing projects like bookclub. She was an active member in one book club and (Stan laughs) she was a secretary for the other bookclub. She would keep track of the list of books they would read for the year and keep that going for them. She just liked people.

PDLC: How long were you and Rita married?

SR: 61 years

PDLC: I always love hearing about how people meet their spouses. How did you and Rita meet?

SR: Well, I was introduced to her through a mutual friend. I became involved with her when there was a New Year's Eve Party....1950....and even though I wasn't going with her at the time....maybe they still do it today....you bring a date.....it didn't have to be your girlfriend or your wife or anything....but you bring a date....to get in the door, sort of thing....and then once you get in the door....you can do what you want (Stan laughs) and I brought Rita....and then we started seeing each other....I have a picture of our first date. It was her birthday. January 27th, 1951. It was downtown Chicago at a basement type place. It was a ratskeller, which is a German restaurant located in a basement hall. We went to a movie downtown...probably the Chicago Theatre... then we went to a place to have a drink and a snack. And I have a picture of that event. They had a photographer walking around. (see attached photo)

PDLC: And then you decided to marry

SR: We would see each other every Friday. I would finish school or work and I'd stop and pick up a pizza and bring it to her parents' house. We'd watch t.v. and eat pizza in her parents living room almost every Friday night. After I finished my classes, we got engaged. Finally, when I was over in Germany (serving in the Army) I found that a lot of guys had fiances and called them over and got marrried.... and they lived happily ever after. So I did the same thing. Rita flew over and we got married in Germany.

PDLC: So you lived with Rita in Germany for some time?

SR: About 8 months....yes

PDLC: And where did you live before Sylvan Lake:

SR: Logan Square in Chicago at Kedzie and Fullerton

PDLC: And where did you grow up?

SR: West side, roughly, Oak Park Avenue and Diversey

PDLC: Stan, did you come from a big family or a small family?

SR: Four kids. Two boys two girls. Two sisters one brother. My two sisters are still living.

PDLC: Is there anything unique about your mom or your dad or brothers or sisters that you want to share?

SR: My dad was probably one of the smartest people I've know. He attended college for about six years. Spoke about six languages. He had a business. (Stan did some math in his head and then said)...so when he was 23 years old he owned a coal yard...in Chicago and it was a whole city block....in size. He was big in his photography. He supported a lot of things for people... charities and so forth....donations...and his time. He kind of amazed me with the things he knew and did. ... especially speaking so many languages....and we lived in an area Chicago where there was an influx of all kinds of Europeans....But he spoke so many languages he could converse with most of them.

PDLC: Was he born here?

SR: Yes, he was born here in 1894

PDLC: ok....this is my last question. Is there anything else about yourself or Sylvan Lake or your family, or anything you just want to share?

SR: (Before I had a chance to finish that question Stan began to answer) My claim to fame at Sylvan Lake is ...ok ...I fended off.....the garbage company. Waste Management. They owned 160 acres between Midlothian and Indian Creek Rd.... right across the street from the lake. They had applied for a landfill.... and I fought that for about two years..... I almost went full time here..... We had hearings.... I was kind of a central point for all these communities around here.... Mundelein... Hawthorn Woods.... those two mainly. I had files.... I had a basement full of files and.... so much paperwork evolved from that.... fighting that.... landfill. I-I..... I had to testify in the court setting in Mundelein... for a couple of days..... why it's not a good place to put a landfill. But I would have moved out of this area if they would have put a landfill in.

PDLC: Well....I'm sure people who live here now are grateful that you did that.

SR: Well....the newer people don't know anything about it .

PDLC: They will now!...(Stan smiles)

PDLC: Stan, I really enjoyed talking with you and I appreciate so much that you shared so much information with me and I can't wait to write it all down and share it with everybody else!
