Schwerman Park Improvements



Over the past month, Schwerman Park has received a couple new additions and updates. A spider climber and wood stump stepping stones were installed, a future garden bed was cut out and mulched and some much needed pea gravel was added, although much more is still needed. Work is still slowly being done, but hopefully soon we have multiple new slides installed.



Other Continuing Projects

Schwerman Park is not the only project we are currently working on. It seems like the SLIA board, Eco-Lakers and other volunteers are constantly working on projects in all our parks and easements. The invasive removal in Briar Terrace is finally complete and new native bushes were purchased and installed by our Eco-Lakers. We are hoping to add a couple more this fall. The shorelines in Maple Park and Ravinia are slowly being improved, but the first step in this is controlling the weeds and unfortunately this takes time. We will continue to add more flowers to the shoreline in Ravinia with help from Eco-Lakers and this fall Tall Grass Restorations will remove the remaining grass and weeds along the shore in maple park and seed with native flowers, grass and sedges. We are currently looking for volunteers to build wood kayak racks in Wildflower and Juneau Terrace and starting to plan for future work in Blue Heron Point, including adding a pier for lake access on W Sylvan Dr South.

Eco-Lakers Update

This year we raised over \$600 by selling vegetable seedlings to our neighbors and friends. Thank you to everyone who purchased them and supported our neighborhood. With the money raised, we purchased 12 native shrubs that we planted in Briar and Hiawatha Terrace. We plan on purchasing more shrubs and flowers this fall.

Over the last couple months Eco-Lakers finished removing the honeysuckle in Briar Terrace, removed more buckthorn in Hiawatha and some honeysuckle and small weedy trees in Ravinia. We also rescued flowers from the Fremont Township native gardens and planted them throughout the neighborhood. We are currently cutting back and treating the regrowth of buckthorn and honeysuckle along W Sylvan with the Fremont Township Highway Department and as always, trying to maintain our neighborhood native gardens.

Fire Truck at the Beach Tradition on the 4th of July

Sylvan Lake has a 4th of July tradition. The beach crowd hears the loud sound of diesel truck engine on Midlothian Road, sees the big red Countryside Fire Protection District fire truck with flashing emergency lights, sirens blaring, horn blasting crossing the dam ...and ...the crowd cheers! Next the pumper is set up and starts to flow a gigantic stream of water towards the beach. Large drops deluge the children and adult children in the water. Small drops and mist deluge the spectators on the beach. Sorry! The roses along the fence across the road get their annual extra watering.



I was a part time Fire Apparatus Engineer/Firefighter on Countryside from 1988 to 2009. When I got qualified to operate the fire trucks in 1993, I got to hear the "Beach Cheers" from the driver seat of the fire truck. The cheers from the Beach are actually louder than the siren. Countryside continued the tradition and has not missed a 4th of July ever since except when emergencies call them to duty.



In addition to making a beautiful rainbow and water display at the beach, pumping water from the lake tests the ability to get water from the lake in an emergency. We live in a community that does not have a water system large enough to supply fire hydrants. We live in a "Rural" area. Fire departments in rural areas use large tanker fire trucks to supply water to portable ponds for other fire trucks to pump from. Trucking water to a fire is very challenging. Running out of water fighting a fire is not an option. Where ponds and lakes are



available, a fire truck can "Draft" water up to 28 ft up from a lake. If the water is open, accessible, and not covered by ice, a floating device is placed on the end of a hose to draft the water. We have a "Dry Hydrant" – a pipe above ground that extends into the lake for the fire truck to draft from at any time of the year, even when the lake is covered by ice. In addition to the 4th of July use – this dry hydrant was used for an ample water supply at the Bittersweet Dr./Highland Dr. house fire several years ago.

To the women and men of the Countryside Fire Protection District for making our 4th of July Beach Tradition so special, thank you.



Floating Islands

In order to promote healthier land and water ecoenvironments of our Sylvan Lake community, invasive plants are pulled, native vegetation is planted, and carp are targeted for removal during Carp-O-Rama. And while it would be nice to think



that the lowland (wet) and upland (dry) natural areas will just, you know, take care of themselves naturally and maintain a strong protective response to unnatural influences, again, the current reality is that nature sometimes needs extra support to mitigate potentially harmful human activity. We can also learn from others who are trying to improve the water quality of lakes, rivers, and ponds and promote eco-friendly environments above and below the waterline.



For example, Sylvan Lake captures run-off which is water + whatever flows along with it from our yards, easements, streets, AND from other nearby low areas, roadways, and building developments. Water is

channeled towards Sylvan Lake as it moves through easement in-flows and from our own neighborhood storm sewer drains. Excess silt, debris, fertilizer, and other pollutants can easily be washed into our lake that can lead to a shallower basin, unbalanced water chemistry, and algal blooms. Considering the seasonal influences of weather plus other factors, our lake holds water for a period of time before evaporation occurs or it makes its way over the dam flowing towards the next wetland area.

Floating eco-islands similar to some sections of the Wild Mile in Chicago just might be applicable to improve the ecological quality of inland impoundment lakes similar to our Sylvan Lake by helping to filter incoming impurities and excess nutrients, oxygenating sedentary water, creating additional above water habitat, and supporting the underwater ecosystem. Another lake neighborhood not far from ours is actively working on similar



projects to improve the water quality of their lake. Remember, a healthier body of water = improved water quality for human recreation and native habitat. It's part of being good stewards of our lake water! Let's be open to ideas that will keep us ahead of the learning curve on healthy water management. Other neighborhoods are doing it ~ we can too!
